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STATE PERSONAL INCOME: SECOND QUARTER 1998

Three western states -- Nevada, Arizona, and Utah -- plus South Carolina and Vermont led the nation in personal income growth in the second quarter of 1998, according to estimates released by the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis. In all five states, fast growth in net earnings (see "Definitions" on page 4) contributed to personal income growth.

For the nation, personal income grew 1.1 percent in the second quarter of 1998 after growing 1.4 percent in the first quarter; the 1.1-percent increase was the smallest gain since an 0.9-percent increase in the second quarter of 1995. In all regions except New England, personal income grew slower in the second quarter than in the first; New England's personal income grew 1.1 percent after growing 0.5 percent.

All 50 states and the District of Columbia had growth rates in personal income in the second quarter that were above the 0.2-percent increase in prices paid by U.S. consumers (as measured by the price index for personal consumption expenditures).

Fastest growing states

In the second quarter of 1998, the five states with the fastest growth in personal income were Nevada (2.0 percent), Arizona (1.8 percent), South Carolina (1.7 percent), Utah (1.6 percent), and Vermont (1.6 percent).

Earnings contributed more to personal income growth in these five states than did transfer payments or dividends, interest, and rent (see table 1, contribution to percent change in personal income).

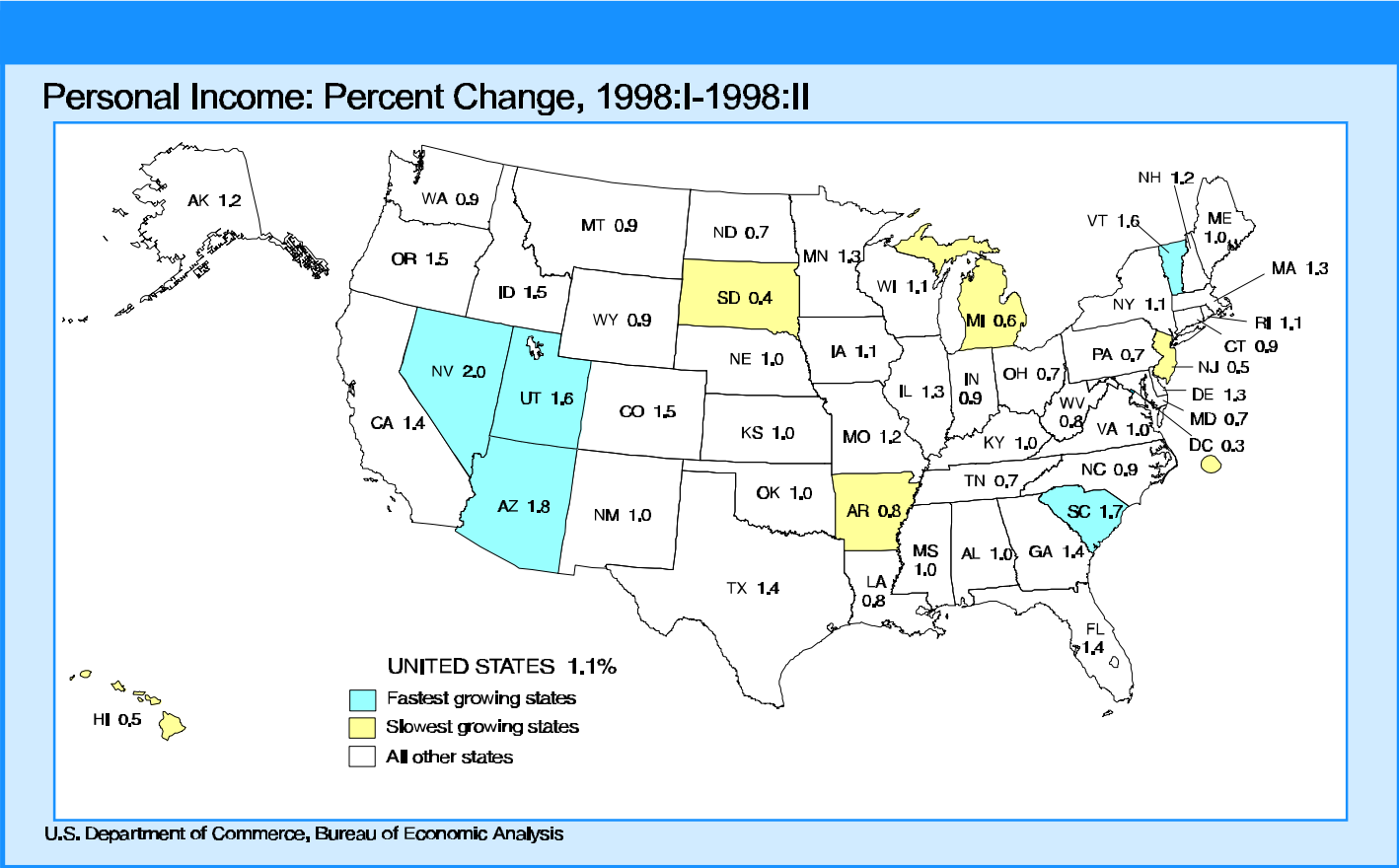

By industry, earnings in services was the major contributor to earnings growth in all five fastest growing states. In addition:

- M In Nevada, earnings in construction, retail trade, and government contributed substantially to earnings growth; the rapid growth in construction earnings reflected the building of new hotels and casinos.
- M In Arizona, earnings in government and in finance, insurance, and real estate contributed substantially to earnings growth.
- M In South Carolina, earnings in manufacturing, retail trade, and government contributed substantially to earnings growth.
- M In Utah, earnings in manufacturing and construction contributed substantially to earnings growth; the rapid growth in construction earnings reflected statewide road reconstruction.
- M In Vermont, earnings in manufacturing and construction contributed substantially to earnings growth.



Slowest growing states

In the second quarter of 1998, the four states with the slowest growth in personal income were South Dakota (0.4 percent), Hawaii (0.5 percent), New Jersey (0.5 percent), and Michigan (0.6 percent).

By industry, earnings declines in manufacturing held back earnings growth in all four slowest growing states. In addition:

- M In South Dakota, the decline in manufacturing earnings mainly reflected a stepdown in bonus payments from a high level in the first quarter of 1998. Earnings declines in farms and mining also contributed to slow growth in earnings.
- M In Hawaii, earnings declines in government, construction, and transportation and public utilities contributed to slow growth in earnings.
- M In New Jersey, a decline in earnings in finance, insurance, and real estate -- mainly reflecting a stepdown in bonus payments from a high level in the first quarter of 1998 -- contributed to slow growth in earnings.
- M In Michigan, the decline in manufacturing earnings reflected the effects of a strike in the motor vehicle industry in the second quarter of 1998.

Contributions to change

In the second quarter of 1998, U.S. personal income increased \$78.0 billion. By type of income, most of the increase was accounted for by a \$62.1 billion increase in net earnings. Transfer payments increased \$6.8 billion, and dividends, interest, and rent increased \$9.1 billion.

U.S. earnings by place of work increased \$66.3 billion. Earnings increased in all major industries except manufacturing and mining. Earnings in services, retail trade, and finance, insurance, and real estate were the major contributors to the earnings growth.

By region, the Southeast region accounted for the largest share (22 percent) of the \$78.0 billion increase in U.S. personal income. The increase in the Southeast was largely accounted for by Florida, Georgia, Virginia, and North Carolina.

Among states, California accounted for the largest share (16 percent) of the increase in U.S. personal income in the second quarter of 1998.

Definitions

Personal income is the income received by all persons from participation in production, from government and business transfer payments, and from government interest. Personal income is the sum of net earnings by place of residence, rental income of persons, personal dividend income, personal interest income, and transfer payments. Net earnings by place of residence is earnings by place of work -- the sum of wage and salary disbursements (payrolls), other labor income, and proprietors' income -- less personal contributions for social insurance, plus an adjustment to convert earnings by place of work to a place-of-residence basis. Personal income is measured before the deduction of personal income taxes and other personal taxes and is reported in current dollars (no adjustment is made for price changes).

The personal income level for the United States in this release is derived as the sum of the state estimates; it differs from the national income and product accounts (NIPA) estimate of personal income because, by definition, it omits the earnings of federal civilian and military personnel stationed abroad and of U.S. residents employed abroad temporarily by private U.S. firms. It can also differ from the NIPA estimate because of different revision schedules.

Private goods-producing industries are defined to consist of farms; agricultural services, forestry, and fishing; mining; construction; and manufacturing. Private services-producing industries are defined to consist of transportation and public utilities; wholesale trade; retail trade; finance, insurance, and real estate; and "services."
